GOSPEL Matthew 22: 1-14 (*shorter form 22:1-10)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

*Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come. Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited" he said "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding."

But they were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them. The king was furious. He despatched his troops, destroyed those murderers and burnt their town. Then he said to his servants, "The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out on to the roads and collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and

the wedding hall was filled with guests.*

so you may make us sharers of his divine nature.



God is generous to his people; his is the gift of life and love, of reconciliation and of justice. He expects us to be generous in return so that others may know his generosity.





Jesus often refers to the Kingdom of God as a feast, at which God presides.

He always talks about the guests who will be present. In this Gospel, Matthew had in mind the Jewish authorities who

believed that they were entitled to be at the feast, but, by rejecting Jesus, the king's son, they were rejecting God's invitation. Jesus announces that everyone was welcome, "good and bad alike," some with whom the Jewish leaders would simply refuse to share a meal. And the poor man without a wedding garment? At first sight, it seems very unjust to banish him, maybe he couldn't afford a proper garment or didn't know he needed one. But no, Matthew was writing to a Christian community, many of whom had converted from Judaism. They were having a very hard time, their families often rejected them and their Jewish communities ostracised them for abandoning the God of their ancestors. So some of them were minded to give up the Christian commitment and return back to their Jewish faith. The wedding garment refers to the Christian faith that they had accepted and put on. Matthew is trying to encourage them to stay, even though life is very difficult for them.

He is warning them, that if they renounce the Christian faith, they may be excluded from the feast in the Kingdom. In the midst of all the difficulties in life which we may face, Jesus asks us to continue being faithful to him.
